

Many members of our club have shared concerns with me about lack of space in their garden or the amount of maintenance needed for a large garden. However, did you know, you can maximize your space by doing several things?

- 1) Be mindful of how much space your plants really need. Many of us tend to leave wide spaces between plants which are not necessary.
- 2) Companion plant to maximize space and minimize maintenance. A good companion planting plan allows you to keep weeds and pests out while making the most out of the resources companion plant groups need.
- 3) Make your plant beds within reach. A general rule is to keep your beds small enough so that you can reach to the center of your bed from every angle (about a three foot radius). This is helpful because several smaller beds are actually much less intimidating than one large one and it makes it so much easier to do maintenance. And, if you adhere to #1 you can plant much more in a small space than you may think.

4) Plant seeds that self seed. If you plant seeds that self seed, such as heirloom/heritage or open pollinated plants, you will be doing less work with more results.

5) Make paths throughout your garden. This (along with #3) will keep you from stepping on and compacting your soil. This allows the roots to grow deeper and the nutrients from the soil to be better utilized. This also allows you to enjoy your garden from within, when you create a path between two beds it can be designed to make it look like a path through a large garden bed which surrounds you and fully immerses you into your garden.

These **five tips** should allow for gardens of any size to be successful and manageable. It is the way I manage my garden and if I can do it anyone can.

The old farmhouse had “crashed and burned” long ago but the joy it had given others could be seen in the beautiful plants that flourished along what had been beds and walkways. A large clump of beardless iris, assumed to be native, has given us special pleasure. Rhizome division has produced hundreds of new plants that form dense clumps of cascading evergreen leaves. “Bouquets” of lavender-blue orchid-like flowers appear in October through March providing an early spring-like feeling

through fall and winter. Sun or shade, poor soils, little water has made this a plant of many hats in our landscape. It's a look-alike native with an appropriate common name of winter iris (*iris unquicularis*). Jo and I have shared hundreds of these “gifts of Love” with others. May it touch their lives with love as it has ours.
