


Clear Lake Trowel & Trellis Garden Club



How Great Thou Art by Jerry



And the irises that Sue Gardner-Neumann and Linda Pyers gave to me, they are planted all over the yard. 

What a fun and enjoyable event, and no rain. To start our civic Beautification Tour, several members meet at Library Park to view the round planters. Thanks to Mary Secord for bringing photos of what we started with and now we can see the results of all the love and energy that members have put

into this project. Unfortunately the empty spots are where plants have been planted and by the next day someone had removed them. This is something the city has to deal with.

Claire Grieve planned the route of the tour, handed out a list of the locations, and off we went to see the next location. Across the street, the large magnolia tree at the side entrance of City Hall, address 225 Park, this tree was donated for Lakeport's Centennial year 1988.

Then we walk over to Court House Square, to the Blue Star Memorial, located next to the Veteran's Building. Carol Brabrook told what plants she and Heide Thompson have planted. And members told how this project was started by CLTTGC to honor our veterans. There is a folder in the Clubhouse with all the details on the dedication.

We walked back to our cars, and drove over to the Fifth Street parking lot near Lakeport Yacht Club - 3 Pichacia trees (and 3 more will be planted this week for Arbor Day).

Westside Park was the next stop, Claire and Mary pointed out the Dog Park, on right by cyclone fence four red horse chestnuts trees were donated last year. Then across street by the cyclone fence are 5 Bradford Pear trees that we donated; also 3 oak trees along the side of that fence.

Next stop was Hartley Cemetery Memorial Gardens lo-


cated next to the Chapel. This garden was created by CLTTGC from a parking lot to this memorial garden in 1985. All the shrubs, trees, bulbs were all donated in memory of someone. Mary Secord's husband designed and created the 2 stain glass windows. And Jo and Jerry's son was the contractor who built the chapel (a man paid to have the building built in memory of his wife, there are chapel bells that can no longer be played because the neighbors do not like the noise). Many members have worked on this garden over the years. The most recent work party projects were appreciated.

Next stop was the Lake County Library, to see the four planter boxes are planted and maintained by Barbara Swanson. I should note that every one of these locations has a sign designed and made by Jerry Shaul. Thank you, Jerry.

Our final stop was held in the Hanson-Linder-Dinsmore-Millberry Memorial Grove. This land was donated to the City of Lakeport by Bob Millberry, and CLTTGC has worked on the property for the past 2+ years creating a native plant and wildflower park. The bag lunch picnic was planned by Betty Atwood-Reyna. Thanks Betty. And thanks to Ann Blue and Jo Douville for setting up the table and bringing the bouquet of flowers. And especially thanks to all those that worked on the work party so that we could have this picnic. Also, Doug Grider had his city employees do the weed eating for us. We all enjoyed visiting, and especially enjoyed our ice cream cones.

Our Garden Club members have worked many hours earning money to purchase plants, bulbs, shrubs and trees for our Civic Beautification projects for many years - these are ongoing projects. As Mary Secord told me - "Civic Beautification, that's what our Garden Club does".

Hope you enjoyed this tour and also learned more about our garden club. There are books documenting the process and progress of Hartley Memorial Garden, Blue Star Dedication, and also Millberry Grove project - these are kept at the clubhouse. Penny Pines History: CLTTGC became a supporter of the Penny Pines Program in Feb, 1990. We raised money for this project in several ways. The membership contributes through donations at our roll call at each meeting, individual members, friends of members or the general public may also support the program through our club.

A plantation may be purchased for \$68. The US Forestry Service will plant 350 seedlings on approximately one acre of land burned by forest fires.

A plantation may be given in memory or honor of whoever you choose. That person will receive a certificate from the Forestry Service and their name will be placed on a sign near the re-forested area.

To date CLTTGC has collected \$3,400; purchased 50 plantations; and planted approx. 17,500 seedlings in the Mendocino National Forest.


