Elderberry . . .

It was 1934 and we were devastated by the “Great One”. The great depression, that is, called upon us Lake County folks to increase our dependancy on the land. It was catfish, deer meat, mud hens, home grown vegetables, Grandpa’s farm, wild berries and federal relief--you kids don’t tell Grandma!! Blue elderberries grew in abundance along creeks and other damp areas. WOW! Just had the strangest feeling in my knees. Dad worked on the farm for butter, eggs, milk, bacon, a place to hunt and an occasional supper. It was a “hippy like” life style. Picnics and fishing on the lake, camping on Bartlet Mountain and scouting for natural food sources like blue elderberries. There it goes again! The Sambucus-caerulea, a native multi-trunk shrub (tree) was easy to spot with its new spring suit of yellow-green foliage. AHA! That’s better. Decorated with small creamy flowers in flat topped clusters soon to be followed by blue-black clusters of berries dusted with bluish powder makes this shrub or tree a stand out. Dad would “pull the plug” on the old ‘27 Chevy and brake to a squealing stop. We all piled out carrying our Saturday night wash tub and proceeded to strip the lower branches of their bounty of ripe berries which had been intended

for the birds to fight over. Mom, with the help of federal relief sugar, made pies, jelly, dump- lings and canned them for the winter months. Uncle Wilfred, who lived next door, was into wine making and always carried a berry gather- ing wash tub in the trunk of his tired old Essex. I remember the day well. There was a come hither fruity odor in the air. I followed my nose to the Essex trunk. The wash tub bubbled with fermenting berries on this hot summer day. I tasted a juice dripping finger and discovered the origin of Delaware punch. Uncle Wilfred’s coffee mug rose to the occa- sion. Three mugs later my knees tingled and I sat down hard on the rear bumper. Scared and confused I struggled home and called for Mom. She looked at me in disbelief and asked where I’d got into the purple stuff. Uncle Wilfred’s elderberry juice. Keep your voice down and stop slurring your words! Now sit down before you fall down and let me help you to bed. You’re not going to throw up are you? Later I heard loud voices and Uncle Wilfred never treated me the same after that. So, if you want a native shrub (tree) of many faces for your landscape and bears fruit that can be used for cooking and wine making, the blue elderberry will serve you well. Josephine say elderberry----I kind of like that feeling.
