

JOSEPHINE'S NURSERY

Josephine, your ornamental garden has become a nursery. Seedlings, root divisions, layering and bird droppings, when given tender loving care, have provided thousands of new plants that could have

been plucked and burned. These new plants adorn your landscape and those of fellow gardeners. They have been received well through plant sales and now 180 tiny but beautiful Japanese Maples will be given to guests at your grand daughter's wedding to symbolize how 'love like a tree grows more beautiful with time'.

Unlike the Japanese Maple which has been propagated from its seeds, you have another exotic beauty that graces our landscape .While leafless in the spring it abounds with bright yellow blossoms that excite the human sense of sight when placed next to plants

that produce blossoms with a bluish hue. With a growth height to 10ft and a spread of 8ft, its vine-like branches gracefully droop and some kiss the ground where they may root if the soil is damp. This, my dear, is how all of your Forsythia Suspense (Weeping Forsythia) made the scene. This propagation process is called 'layering'.

Most plants can be encouraged to root by layering by forcing a branch to touch, be secured and covered with damp soil. Exposing a small area of cambium layer may accelerate root growth. Like Josephine you end up with a clone of the Mother and a plant that when weaned from the Mother and potted is equivalent to a one gallon nursery plant.

Josephine, don't you think it would look better if you used only the lower branches.

Master Gardeners of Lake County-Fall Gardening Program...

On August 14, the Lake County Master Gardeners held a Fall Vegetable Planting Workshop at Konocti Vista Casino. It was well attended and a couple of other CLTTGC members were there. too. There was so much information given that I left feeling that I learned a lot but was really grateful for the handouts because there was way too much information to remember. The topics covered were Soil Amendments and Soil Preparation, Water Management, The 10-Steps of Seed Starting, and Transplanting Vegetables in Lake

County. It was a lot to cover in a three-hour workshop but was a teaser for more specialized workshops in the future. The best handout I received was "Lake County Challenges and Ways to Deal with Them". Just in case you need to be reminded, these challenges include our short growing season, huge temperature swings within 24 hours, clay soil that becomes hard as cement when dry, hot summers with intense UV radiation, frequently wet winters, and, of course, deer, gophers, and ground squirrels (and I'm sure you

can think of a few more critters that challenge you in your garden). **Deer**: fencing is the only real option, if you grow vegetables. **Gophers**: raised beds lined with hardware cloth at the bottom, traps. Ground squirrels: protect susceptible crops with mesh bags, stockings, cages. This made me very grateful for my 6' fence and eight raised beds and confirmed that I am doing some things right even though I am a novice. We'll keep you posted as the Master Gardeners offer other workshops and don't forget the helpline-263-6838.

Lake Ka-ba-tin Redbud Arrangers

All members are automatically members of this flower arranging group. We meet on the second Tuesday each month (except Jul & Aug) at the Mendo-Lake Credit Union's conference room (11th St in Lakeport). WARNING: Nancy Benkelman noticed a strange growth on her petunia plants. After doing some research, it was determined to be <u>dodder</u>. (Cuscuta sp.) According to the Master Gardeners Handbook, dodder is a slender, twining plant that produces a dense, tangled mat of yellow or orange strands that entwine and spread over host plants such as tomatoes, cantaloupe, onion and alfalfa. Dodder seed over-winters in the soil, where it germinates and enters the host tissue. Control of Cuscuta can be difficult. Certain herbicides will help. If anyone has had experience with this, let us know.
