Fool Mother Nature

Josephine, what a treat it is to drive through Scotts Valley this time of year: Redbuds, Redbuds and more Redbuds (Western Redbud - Cercis Occidentalis) with their naked bodies clothed in their finest magenta costumes. When pollinated, these beautiful blossoms will be transformed into seed bearing pods. The pods, designed to open and "fly" in the wind can scatter the seeds over some distance. When



left to natural processes it may take years for the seeds to germinate. How-

ever, man in all his "great wisdom" has learned to accelerate these processes. First we select only the largest seeds from the most recent growth and from plants growing in our area. We must then fool "Mother Nature". To overcome internal dormancy store the seeds, while still in the pods, in the refrigerator for 6 to 8 weeks (cold stratification). Seed coat dormancy is overcome by "nicking" the seed coat with nail clippers taking care not to damage the embryo (scarification). Sow 3 seeds ¼" deep in each 4" pot filled with potting soil and place them outdoors where they can be subjected to

natural weather conditions. Root growth is rapid. making it necessary to carefully transplant each seedling into a gallon container after several months. Since redbuds are not water tolerant, water sparingly. After 2 years place plants in the landscape. Redbuds require full sun, good drainage, humus or slow release fertilizers. Deep irrigation once per week is required for the first 2 summers. Use drip never flood.

SPOTLIGHT—GARDEN OF THE MONTH

The Joy of Daylilies: Daylilies (Hemerocallis) love our Lake County climate. I grow over 500 varieties of the 68,000 daylilies registered with the American Hemerocallis Society. Daylilies are not just for highway median strips or shopping malls! They come in every color except blue and true white. Blooms start in May and go through October with the peak month in June. Daylily fans grow into clumps so even though the flowers last 1 day,



there can be many blooming at one time and most varieties bloom for 1 to 2 weeks. Daylilies are great companion plants and make a showy statement in perennial beds or large planters. I have my daylilies interspersed with other perennials of roses, foxglove, snapdragons and peonies.

Just give them plenty of water, sunshine, good soil and spray with a monthly dose of fish emulsion. If yours do not bloom they are either planted too deep (the most common reason) or they are too crowded. Daylily clumps need to be divided every 3-4 years into 2 to 3 fan divisions. The maintenance is not overwhelming: groom dead leaves, deadhead spent blooms and keep the area weeded.

I never saw a discontented tree. They grip the ground as though they liked it, & though fast rooted they travel about as far as we do—John

Greg Giusti gave an informative talk about these little pests in our gardens. Now you are armed with the info to rid your garden of these frustrating critters. Good Luck!



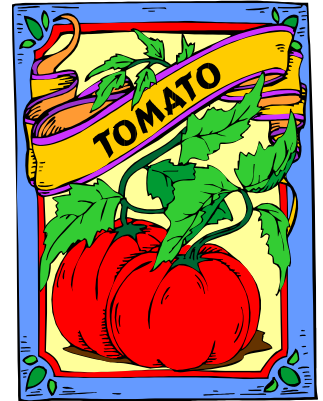
