Daffodil Tea News

If you're a coffee lover, the following tricks will add flavor to your day!

(Super Market Super Gardens, by Jerry Baker)

1. Some of the most beautiful flowering shrubs of all, like azaleas, camellias, and rhododendrons, prefer their soil on the acidic side. A few edibles - including strawberries, blueberries, and potatoes - do too. So do those sourpusses in your yard a big favor: Pour cold coffee right on the soil around them. They'll love you for it, and they'll show it by delivering bushels of blooms, berries, and tasty tubers.

2. You know how coffee (or rather, the caffeine in it) gives you a big jolt of energy in the morning? Well, it can do just the same for any of the homemade insecticides that you may brew up. All you need to do is to substitute good old java for the water called for in the recipe!

3. Mosquitoes, those villainous vampires of the pest world will lay their eggs in any body of standing water --even standing puddles. While you may not be able to drain all of the micro-mini "ponds" in your yard, you can see to it that they don't turn into mosquito maternity wards. How? Just pour old, cold coffee into the water. (Of course, good fresh coffee will work just as well, but why waste it?) But forget the decaf stuff....it's the caffeine that does the trick. Scientists have discovered that when mosquito larvae are exposed to caffeine, they get so confused that they can't tell which way is up, and they drown!

4. After a long, damp, or even not-so-damp winter, even the best-kept shop or garden shed can start smelling a little musty. You can fix that in a hurry by grinding up some coffee beans very fine, pour the ground coffee onto a plate, and set it on your workbench or other surface for a day or two. Then breathe in the fresh air!

5. As all you container-gardeners know, when you water potted plants, you have to keep the flow going until it starts coming out of the holes in the bottom of the pot. But as that water runs out, it carries some of the valuable soil nutrients along with it. That's why it's crucial to keep up a regular feeding program.

Here's a meal that your container plants are sure to appreciate:

- 2 TBS of brewed black coffee
- 2 TBS of whiskey
- 1 tsp of fish emulsion
- 1/2 tsp of gelatin powder
- 1/2 tsp of baby shampoo
- 1/2 tsp of ammonia
- 1 gal. of water

Mix all ingredients in a watering can, and water your potted plants with the mixture to keep them happy, healthy, and full of flowers!


