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
Trellis Talk | November 2013



SAGE ADVISE

Believe it or not, used paper grocery bags are really useful.

prove your soil in the process



- 1. Make Compost: Since brown paper bags are a first-class source of carbon, tear them up or shred them and toss the pieces into your compost bin...OR...just bury the pieces in your garden where they'll break down and im-
- 2. Get Rid of Weeds: If you're making a path, walkway, etc. trample or mow down any tall weeds then spread brown paper bags on top. over-lapping as you go, until you have a layer of three or four bags. Next, add whatever footfriendly substance you want like gravel, bark, etc. If you want a planting bed, pile 6 to 8 inches of topsoil and compost on the bags, and you're good to go.
- 3. Protect Your Plants from the Cold: In the spring, though the calendar says it's time to plant. Ma Nature may still be capricious. Paper bags may help give you some weather insurance. At planting time, as you dig each hole, set a paper bag (opened and upright) inside so that the top 10 or so inches of it are above soil surface. Fill the bag to soil level with your planting mix, roll the bag top down to form a collar on outside of the bag, and plant your seedling. At first sign of frost, roll up the collars on your bags and fasten them closed with a clothespin or two. Your plants will stay cozy and warm inside. After all danger of frost has passed, simply cut off as much of your bag as you can, leaving the rest alone to decompose.
- 4. Harvest Your Seeds: When your flowers fade and the seedpods start turning brown, cover each plant with a brown paper bag, and tie it closed at the bottom with twine. Then when the stems turn brown, clip off the plant at ground level, tip the bag over, and take it indoors. Give the bag a good shake every few days to loosen the seeds. When you hear loose seeds rattling around, remove the twine, cut off the stems, and store the bag in a cool dry place until planting time.

- 5. **Keep your windshield ice-free:** Cut paper bags down the sides to open them up, spread them across the wind-shield and secure them in place with the wiper blades. In the morning, toss them into the compost pile, into your recycling bin, or put them aside to reuse them.
- 6. Keep your car's interior cool in summer: Can't find your windshield protector? Use paper bags instead. Cut them open, lay them against the inside of your windshield, and lower your visor to hold the paper in place!
- 7. Keep your steering wheel cool: Cut a 10inch slit in one side of a brown paper bag and slip the bag over your steering wheel!
- 8. Ripen tomatoes faster: If you have to pick 'em while they're green or even semi-green, put them in a brown paper bag and store at room temperature. The bag will help to retain the natural gasses that cause the fruit to ripen, If you have a ripe apple, toss it into the bag, too, ---it'll give off gases that speed up the ripening process even more. NOTE: The same trick works for fruit, too. Try it on peaches, pears, avocados, bananas, and apples.
- 9. Keep Onions Fresh Longer: Whether homegrown or supermarket produce, onions can be kept at their peak freshness and flavor for two or three months if you put them in a brown paper bag and store them in the bottom shelf of your refrigerator.
- 10. **Dry Herbs:** In order to retain their volatile oils, herbs need to dry in near total darkness. If no room in your house meets that requirement, you can create it this way: Gather the sprays into bunches of five to six stems each, tie with twine, then put each bunch upside down in a paper bag, making sure that the herbs are not touching the bottom of the bag. Now, fasten the top of the bag with a rubber band and hang the bundles from anything that'll hold them.




